Figen has been on our Board for 18 months and has always known since her training days that Beacon was a very highly regarded organisation in the local counselling

Beacon volunteer in Tanzania to help hospitals

Beacon's computer database expert, Gordon Jackson, has just arrived in Tanzania to take part in an important project. As well as being one of our volunteers, Gordon is also a member of the local Bramhall and Woodford Rotary Club who are sponsoring his work there. He has just sent us this message:

"I'm here in Tanzania for a month to help train people to repair hospital equipment. I'm part of a scheme organised by Duke University in North Carolina who send about a dozen students a year, with 2 instructors, to learn about repairing equipment and to gain a better understanding of the needs of the country.

The local people have medical equipment but no means of repairing it when it breaks down and the repairs that would be simple for us cannot be carried out because of lack of suitable spares and skills.

Unfortunately Duke University has not grasped the idea of sustainability when it comes to equipment repair but prefers to send students over to learn to fix stuff under guidance, and then return home. There is no attempt to train local people or to set up a repair facility that will continue after the students have left. My job is therefore to engage the hospitals in setting up an educational programme – and possible facilities – to ensure that the skills are not lost once the team has departed. Duke University will not take part in such a programme, but Rotary is well able to set it up.

There will be about 15 hospitals involved, from the mountains at the base of Kilimanjaro to the open plains around the Ngorongoro crater near the village of Karatu. All transport is local and apparently I will be shaken, rattled and rolled quite a lot."

Everyone in Beacon sends Gordon the best of luck in his endeavour to leave a lasting legacy in Tanzania
